The Rhythm of the Saints: Ancestral Voices Dr. Michael White and his New Orleans Jazz Ensemble

During the final days of October and into the first week of November, Christian churches mark All Saint's Day, or All Soul's Day. It is a time in which we honor the lives of those who have died during the past year, but it's also a time to recognize the wisdom and witness of those who have come before us. In similar fashion, African and Indigenous traditions also use that time to honor their own wisdom keepers of the past, in celebrations that often last for several days. From Mexico City to Havana, from Port-au-Prince to New Orleans, up and down the Americas and throughout other parts of the world as well, that summoning forth of ancient wisdom shall take place. It's a cultural practice that we in Old Lyme do well to emulate, and uphold.

Once again this year, Dr. Michael White and his New Orleans Jazz Ensemble will return to Old Lyme to help us all to recognize and affirm the ancestral voices that have guided us individually and collectively - along our life journeys. With a sound that reaches back to the earliest days of jazz, one that is, in truth, older than jazz, and older than the country itself, Michael White's music calls to the ancestors, even as it raises the tired and flagging spirits of those privileged to hear Michael's ancient/modern songs. These are songs meant to raise the dead. These are songs that establish a rhythm for the saints, for those now departed and for those still living.

On Saturday November 5th, at 5:00 in the Meetinghouse, Michael and his band will perform a concert in honor of the ancestral voices that continue to guide and shape our living. The concert is free and open to the public, though a free-will offering will be taken.

On Sunday, November 6th, at 10:00 in the Meetinghouse, Michael and his band will return for a Sacred Jazz Worship Service, during which wisdom keepers of the past, and of the present, shall be honored.

Join us for a weekend of New Orleans jazz, meant to heal and instruct, to inspire and inflame, as we honor the ancestral voices that have come before us.




Tree of Life Educational Fund | Fall 2022 Speaker Series

journalist in this field, she wished to experience the situation on the ground. As the city of Hebron is justifiably called a microcosm of the 'conflict', this seemed the right place to go. She enrolled in a human rights and Arabic program at a local center for two months. In the third month, she carried out her own journalistic research on the violence of settlers in the city of Hebron and wrote an article that was published on Mondoweiss. In addition, during her time in Hebron she wrote a personal blog about her experiences, which was picked up by a Dutch pro-Palestine organization that asked her to speak on protests and solidarity meetings. Melissa is the Care Coordinator for Community Peacemaker Teams (CPT), formerly Christian Peacemaker Teams. She uses the framework of Healing Justice to accompany her colleagues in their vital work in conflict zones. Prior to joining CPT, for over 20 years, she worked in Philadelphia and New York City non-profit organizations, seeking out the intersection of spirituality and justice. Along with incarcerated women and women living on the outside, she co-founded an Associate Degree program at a prison in New York City and taught undergraduate students as a professor at the Oregon Extension of Eastern University. Along with her work at CPT, Melissa nurtures space for people to heal and thrive through spiritual companionship/direction and facilitates retreats where she lives with her family on Lenni Lenape Land, known as Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
