Luke 24: 28-32

As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over." So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him, and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?"

Acts 8: 26-31, 35-40

Then an angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, the queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him.

Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water, and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

A couple weeks ago, Tom and I went on a romantic date for our 31st wedding anniversary - in tandem we celebrated 31 years together with this church. In the past few years, I have stepped back from my job as a clinical social worker at Isaac School in New London and Tom has retired from the Geography faculty at CCSU - we are not fully retired, but we're scratching our way in that direction!

In our 31 years here at FCCOL, we've led the Junior & Senior PF groups; we've worked at the food pantry; served at the Homeless Hospitality Center in New London; travelled to the Storefront School in Harlem, NY; been Deacons in the church; participated in a Fuller Build project in El Salvador; sung with the choir; made multiple trips to Israel and Palestine with the Tree of Life partnership; served on the Missions Board and Environmental Committee; worked on multiple local Habitat for Humanity projects; made trips to Haiti with the Crosby Fund for Haitian Education; volunteered at the White Elephant Sale; trekked three times to the Cheyenne River Reservation in Green Grass, SD; travelled to Koinonia Farm in Americus, GA; worked with the Refugee Resettlement Committee; and enjoyed a cultural exchange to Cuernavaca, Mexico.

Ultimately, it was this church that provided much of the cultural diversity that we felt our corner of Connecticut lacked. Through this church, our children enjoyed a wealth of experience that helped shape them into the understanding young men they are still becoming. We have stayed in Old Lyme, but we have downsized into a horrid little house by the Three Mile River estuary. We spend our free time redoing the house to accommodate our pending retirement. In a chaotic and uncertain world, we rely on the church as our unflagging touchstone that anchors us in community. When we had our little run-in with Covid, it was our friends here that were the first to drop by with generous meals. Giving yearly to the church has been a priority for us and as we plan for our future, we always budget for the FCCOL. We have met with the church about long-term giving and hope to incorporate that vehicle into our estate planning.

When Steve reminds us each Sunday that, "it is good to be together in this place," we understand that at the deepest level. Thank you to all in the FCCOL family that continue to wonderfully enrich our lives.

The Rhythm of the Saints: Ancestral Voices Dr. Michael White and his New Orleans Jazz Ensemble

During the final days of October and into the first week of November, Christian churches mark All Saint's Day, or All Soul's Day. It is a time in which we honor the lives of those who have died during the past year, but it's also a time to recognize the wisdom and witness of those who have come before us. In similar fashion, African and Indigenous traditions also use that time to honor their own wisdom keepers of the past, in celebrations that often last for several days. From Mexico City to Havana, from Port-au-Prince to New Orleans, up and down the Americas and throughout other parts of the world as well, that summoning forth of ancient wisdom shall take place. It's a cultural practice that we in Old Lyme do well to emulate, and uphold.

Once again this year, Dr. Michael White and his New Orleans Jazz Ensemble; including Gregg Stafford, Kerry Lewis and Detroit Brooks, will return to Old Lyme to help us all to recognize and affirm the ancestral voices that have guided us - individually and collectively - along our life journeys. With a sound that reaches back to the earliest days of jazz, one that is, in truth, older than jazz, and older than the country itself, Michael White's music calls to the ancestors, even as it raises the tired and flagging spirits of those privileged to hear Michael's ancient/modern songs. These are songs meant to raise the dead. These are songs that establish a rhythm for the saints, for those now departed and for those still living.

On Saturday November 5th, at 5:00 in the Meetinghouse, Michael and his band will perform a concert in honor of the ancestral voices that continue to guide and shape our living. The concert is free and open to the public, though a free-will offering will be taken.

On Sunday, November 6th, at 10:00 in the Meetinghouse, Michael and his band will return for a Sacred Jazz Worship Service, during which wisdom keepers of the past, and of the present, shall be honored.

Join us for a weekend of New Orleans jazz, meant to heal and instruct, to inspire and inflame, as we honor the ancestral voices that have come before us.
