"Letter from a Birmingham Jail" Litany

1st Excerpt:

I am in Birmingham because injustice is here. Just as the prophets of the eighth century B.C. left their villages and carried their "thus saith the Lord" far beyond the boundaries of their hometowns, and just as the Apostle Paul left his village of Tarsus and carried the gospel of Jesus Christ to the far corners of the Greco Roman world, so am I compelled to carry the gospel of freedom beyond my own home town...I cannot sit idly by in Atlanta and not be concerned about what happens in Birmingham. Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly.

Congregation says: We Shall Overcome.

2nd Excerpt:

You deplore the demonstrations taking place in Birmingham. But your statement, I am sorry to say, fails to express a similar concern for the conditions that brought about the demonstrations...Racial injustice engulfs this community. Birmingham is probably the most thoroughly segregated city in the United States. Its ugly record of brutality is widely known. (People of color) have experienced grossly unjust treatment in the courts. There have been more unsolved bombings of homes and churches in Birmingham than in any other city in the nation. These are the hard, brutal facts of the case.

Congregation says: We Shall Overcome.

3rd Excerpt:

In any nonviolent campaign (like ours) there are four basic steps: collection of the facts to determine whether injustices exist; negotiation; self purification; and direct action.

You may well ask: "Why direct action? Why sit ins, marches and so forth? Isn't negotiation a better path?" You are quite right in calling for negotiation. Indeed, this is the very purpose of

direct action. Nonviolent direct action seeks to create such a crisis and foster such a tension that a community which has constantly refused to negotiate is forced to confront the issue.

Just as Socrates felt that it was necessary to create a tension in the mind so that individuals could rise from the bondage of myths and half truths...so must we see the need for nonviolent gadflies to create the kind of tension in society that will help people rise from the dark depths of prejudice and racism to the majestic heights of understanding and brotherhood.

Congregation says: We Shall Overcome.

Amazing Grace Lisa Williamson

4th Excerpt:

We know through painful experience that freedom is never voluntarily given by the oppressor; it must be demanded by the oppressed... We must come to see..that "justice too long delayed is justice denied."

Since we so diligently urge people to obey the Supreme Court's decision of 1954 outlawing segregation in the public schools, it may seem rather paradoxical for us consciously to break laws...There are two types of laws: just and unjust. I would be the first to advocate obeying just laws. One has not only a legal but a moral responsibility to obey just laws. Conversely, one has a moral responsibility to disobey unjust laws. I would agree with St. Augustine that "an unjust law is no law at all." Any law that uplifts human personality is just. Any law that degrades human personality is unjust.

Congregation says: We Shall Overcome.

5th Excerpt:

I must confess that over the past few years I have been gravely disappointed with the white moderate...The white moderate, who is more devoted to "order" than to justice; who prefers a negative peace which is the absence of tension to a positive peace which is the presence of justice...Shallow understanding from people of good will is more frustrating than absolute misunderstanding from people of ill will...

We will have to repent in this generation not merely for the hateful words and actions of the bad people but for the appalling silence of the good people. Human progress never rolls in on wheels of inevitability; it comes through the tireless efforts of those willing to be co workers with God...Now is the time to lift our national policy from the quicksand of racial injustice to the solid rock of human dignity.

Congregation says: We Shall Overcome.

6th Excerpt:

Though I was initially disappointed at being categorized as an extremist...I gradually gained a measure of satisfaction from the label. Was not Jesus an extremist for love: "Love your

enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you." Was not Amos an extremist for justice: "Let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like an ever flowing stream."

So the question is not whether we will be extremists, but what kind of extremists we will be. Will we be extremists for hate or for love? Will we be extremists for the preservation of injustice or for the extension of justice?

Congregation says: We Shall Overcome.

7th Excerpt:

If today's church does not recapture the sacrificial spirit of the early church, it will lose its authenticity, forfeit the loyalty of millions, and be dismissed as an irrelevant social club with no meaning for the twentieth century. Every day I meet young people whose disappointment with the church has turned into outright disgust. Is organized religion too inextricably bound to the status quo to save our nation and the world?

We will reach the goal of freedom in Birmingham and all over the nation, because the goal of America is freedom...One day (the country) will know that when these disinherited children of God sat down at lunch counters, they were in reality standing up for what is best in the American dream and for the most sacred values in our Judaeo- Christian heritage, thereby bringing our nation back to those great wells of democracy which were dug deep by the founding fathers in their formulation of the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence.

A note about the hymn: *Take My Hand, Precious Lord* was one of Dr. King's favorite hymns. According to musician Ben Branch, who was with King at the Lorraine Hotel on April 4, 1968, King requested that he play the hymn at that evening's meeting of the Southern Christian Leadership Council in Memphis. King was shot minutes later. At the request of his family, Mahalia Jackson performed the hymn at his funeral.

Spirit Visions of New Orleans: March 17-22. Long before Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on a Montgomery bus, Homer Plessy did the same on a train in New Orleans. That occurred in 1892, and it was arguably the first action (or first flame) following the collapse of Reconstruction, in what we now understand to be the modern Civil Rights Movement. Sadly, it took another 60 years for the fire to catch, but the match was struck in New Orleans. They've been lighting flames of the spirit ever since in that town, in music, public art, street ritual and theater, and in movements toward human rights and justice.

From March 17-22, members and friends of FCCOL are invited to visit the city of New Orleans, to learn about its unique culture, and to witness the many ways that the city has nurtured a vision of human life that is creative, celebratory, and just. We'll take to the streets with Black Masking Indians on St. Joseph's Night, one of the ritual focal points of both African descended peoples and Italians living in the city. We'll join a Second Line, visit artists in their homes, visit jazz clubs, experience house concerts with local musicians, and attend a gospel church service on Sunday. We'll hear from writers and justice advocates. We'll sample some of the best food and drink on the planet. And we'll learn about the history of New Orleans, of its historic connections to Haiti and other parts of the Caribbean, and with Africa itself. These are all a part of the unique spirit, and spirituality, that surrounds the city of New Orleans.
