

Scripture Readings

Luke 19:28-40

After he had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.' "So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" They said, "The Lord needs it." Then they brought it to Jesus, and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. Now as he was approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying, "Blessed is the One who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!" Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, order your disciples to stop." He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out."

Mark 12:28-31

One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well he asked him, "Which commandment is the first of all?" Jesus answered, "The first is, 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these."

More on Maundy Thursday Evening - Reading of Dante's Inferno

On Thursday evening at 7 PM just following our Maundy Thursday service, some of our members and friends will each read one of the 34 Cantos that make up Dante's "Inferno." The poem begins on Maundy Thursday. And so, it is fitting that we read it on this particular night. It is long! If you get restless or sleepy, get up and walk around. Walk out and get a cup of coffee. Or go to sleep in the pews! If you can't make it through the entire reading, just come for part of it. Let your curiosity be piqued. Above all, have fun with it. Relish the fact that you're able to explore one of the world's great classics this Holy Week, a text that has funded the imagination of generations of religious and secular thinkers alike.

The Lyme/Old Lyme Refugee Resettlement Committee is looking for people to help with new refugees coming to our community in the near future. You will get a sense of the needs of refugee families and how you might help.

Turkey/Syria Earthquake Response: The Board of Missions has allocated \$4,000 to help victims of earthquakes in Turkey and Syria. An additional \$2,000 has been sent by members of the congregation. At this point we have forwarded the accumulated \$6,000 to IRC (International Rescue Committee) of New York to aid in the rescue support work they have already begun. If further donations are received, they will be forwarded as quickly as possible. Should you want to make an additional gift, please do so by sending your gift to the office as a check made out to FCCOL with "earthquake relief" in the memo line.

Church World Service (CWS) Blanket Drive: This is the last day of the CWS Blanket Drive. Please remember the sad people who have lost everything due to tornadoes, floods and an overabundance of snow who would welcome a warm blanket.
