
# DECEMBER 2023



#### Dear Friends,

Several years ago I had the opportunity, along with several other Tree of Life travelers, to visit the Church of the Holy Nativity in Bethlehem, the site where Jesus is reputed to have been born. At the front of the church, one can descend a stairway into a grotto, the place where, supposedly, the manger would have been found. And then within the grotto, one can reach into a hole to touch a rock, which, we were told, was the very spot in which Christ had been laid as a baby. I openly confess that I am a little skeptical of such sites as historical markers. I don't, in other words, really believe that Jesus was born right there. Even so, I stood in line and waited for my turn at the hole. When it came time, I reached my hand in and placed it upon the rock. As expected, I felt no shudder of recognition, and I experienced no moment of awakening. I felt only...a rock.

If I am skeptical of the sites themselves, I am far less skeptical of the truths such sites have the power to convey. Where, precisely, Jesus was born does not interest me. That he once came into the world, and comes into it still, is a truth that moves me to the core. That there are those who continue to embody the grace and the courage that he exhibited is, in large part, what grounds me in my work as a minister. The nativity of Christ continues to occur, over and over again.

As we turn toward Advent, and toward the manger, I am haunted

by what is happening in the land in which Christ was born. We all are. But I am led to consider the many people in that battle scarred region that somehow manage to allow the living Christ to be born into the world once again. I think of a theater troupe in the Jenin refugee camp, who perform the sorrows of those living in the camps scattered throughout the West Bank. The players listen carefully to the stories that residents of each camp tell, and then they spontaneously act out the scenes, somehow returning to the original teller of the story their agency, and their dignity. In such a way, Christ is born anew. I think of the peacemaker teams who accompany Palestinians through the worst stretches of hell in the town of Hebron, protecting them from

the stones, spit, urine and trash (and far worse) that is too often hurled at them by settlers. In such accompaniments, Christ is born anew. I think of former Israeli soldiers who did as the old Spiritual instructed - they laid down their swords and shields (or in this case their machine guns and body armor), refusing to participate any longer in the dehumanization of Palestinians. In such a way, Christ is born anew. And I think of a young Israeli refusenik, who chose prison rather than military service, because she would not learn to kill in the name of a country. In such a way, Christ is born anew. These are, obviously, not followers of the child born in Bethlehem in a literal sense - most come from different traditions entirely. But they radiate the spirit of the one born in Bethlehem, who we gather to celebrate during the Christmas season.

I'm glad to be entering this season once again. A decorated Meetinghouse, Advent Christmas hymns, the Christmas Pageant (held this year on Sunday morning, December 17th), and the run of services on Christmas Eve, all fill me with gladness. Important and good as those things are, they are not meant to be mistaken for the thing itself the coming of Christ into the world - any more than the stone at the Church of the Nativity is meant to reveal the Spirit of the living Christ to us. Such things merely disclose a pattern, made real in the human beings who labor to bring Christ into the world over and over. As the theologian Angelus Silesius put it, "Christ could be born a thousand times but all in vain until He is born in me."

That's the task - and the question - this holiday season. How might Christ be born in each of us? How might we come to embody the child laid in the straw? It need not be as dramatic as the instances I cited earlier, though surely finding ways to stand for human rights in Palestine - and elsewhere - is among the ways we might embody that child. For the most part, though, I think it will occur in the gestures of care we extend. The patient listening to the story of another. A call to one who is grieving the loss of a beloved partner. A genuine question of interest offered to a child. A smile to a stranger while passing through the market. Saying "I love you" to those given to each of us along our pilgrimage through life. In such a way, Christ is born anew.

On November 18th the Youth Group met at the church at 6:00am and headed to New York City to distribute the clothing and food to the homeless.






# GIVING MATTERS-YEAR-END MESSAGE

## MOMENT FOR STEWARDSHIP

Today, I want to share with you one of the wonderful things you make possible through your stewardship.

Recently, I visited Martin House in Norwich. Martin House provide flexible support to 54 individuals with a range of challenges from chronic homelessness; mental illness, addictions and cognitive disability in a group living facility. The agency focuses on positive healthy living, communication and employment skills. The length of stay ranges from six months to four years, but recently that has lengthened due to the difficulty of finding affordable and subsidized housing. Martin House's mission, in their own words, "is accomplished by providing dignified housing, nutritious food, a safe, caring environment, and supportive services for 54 men and women who seldom experience any of these."

On my visit I met three residents. One with a cognitive disability, another with clear mental health issues and another who was just returning from work. They were all friendly and curious about me being in their home. I met and spoke with four staff, one who had been working there for over 30 years. Their dedication and commitment to the residents and program was impressive. The program can't afford a janitor, so residents and staff all chip in to keep the large facility clean. Like many social agencies, they could use an infusion of help, painting hallways, upgrading furniture and funds. The staff wanted me to tell you how much they have appreciated **FCCOLs** support since 1998.

Martin House is just one local agency that we have funded.

This year, we have provided \$21,500 in funding to support 11 local programs. Overall, our local focus has been on supporting agencies that lift up people dealing with poverty.

The church's 2023 budget projected that there would be \$80K with a 10% hold back if the church's income does not come in as budgeted. It is not clear yet, how this is going to come out for this year. Last year, the trustee's found it necessary to hold back the 10%. They may again need to do that this year. Our church's remarkable generosity can only be accomplished because of your support.

In closing, I'd like to share a personal story.

In 1963, my father bought a selfwinding Omega watch which he was very proud of and used daily for the rest of his life. During the last few weeks of his life, as his daily movements lessened, his watch started to slow down and would stop. When this happened it caused him great distress. A few days before he died, he said to me, "Erik, my watch is not working. I think it's broken." The first time this happened I became concerned, asked if I could see it and whether he wanted me to get it fixed. After looking at it, winding it and shaking it, it started ticking again. I set the time, put it back on his wrist and said, "Dad, it's ticking! It's a self-winding watch and it has to keep moving to keep going." He was relieved to have it back on his wrist keeping time the way he was accustomed for a little bit longer.

As a congregation we are like my father's self-winding watch. Without movement we will stop working.

We are blessed at FCCOL to have the leadership, and gifts that keep us moving with a steadfast outward focused mission. This is remarkable, but like any vibrant organization it needs to grow to be sustained. Please consider taking a step up in your monetary giving for 2024 to magnify what Jesus said, that "whatever we do for these brothers and sisters of mine you do for me". It's not too late.
