Far from sentimental, these scripture stories invite us to consider the courage it takes to stand up to empire and pay attention to another way home.




During the past year, Dr. Mazin Qumsiyeh has reported from the site of an ongoing catastrophe, chronicling the carnage of Gaza from his home in Bethlehem. His dispatches have been essential tools for comprehending the inhumanity of that scene, while reminding his many readers that another way, more just and humane, remains possible. Indeed, for the past twenty years, Mazin has been doing just that from the Palestine Natural History Museum, a space of incomparable beauty surrounded by the horror of a military occupation. From there, Mazin has welcomed countless Tree of Life and FCCOL travelers over the years, sharing his singular vision blending the natural sciences and the work of human rights. Mazin is the author of several books, most notably *Popular Resistance in Palestine: A History of Hope and Empowerment* (2011). In this season of Advent, as we grapple with a widening crisis throughout the Middle East, Mazin's perspective from Bethlehem is one that we desperately need to hear.

Mark Braverman too has been a long time friend of Tree of Life and of FCCOL. Mark comes to us from the Jewish tradition, and he is the executive director of Kairos, USA, an organization dedicated to helping Christians, Jews, and Muslims recover the moral and prophetic dimensions of their faith. He is the author of two books, *Fatal Embrace: Christians, Jews, and the Search for Peace in the Holy Land* (2010), and *A Wall in Jerusalem: Hope, Healing and the Struggle for Justice in Israel and Palestine* (2013). During the present crisis, Mark's voice has been crucial in disentangling Judaism and Christianity in particular from the logic and practices of nationalism, militarization, colonialism, and genocide. Mark's reverence for the Bible has led him to find surprising and beautiful insights providing hope in a time of devastation.

We hope you'll join us on both Sunday, December 8 and Monday, December 9 as we hear from these exemplary voices of faith and conscience.

Shoreline Soup Kitchens and Pantries

It was a Saturday morning like many before it: The Fellowship Hall was set up with food stations ranging from fresh produce and eggs to pasta, meat, beans, soup and bread, each with assigned volunteers smiling and chatting with families. There was a unique mix of music playing, and volunteers sang or swayed to the tunes. Guests waited for their numbers to be called by our Front End volunteers, who then provided an empty carriage and bags, after they checked in with our Registrar.

What made this week special was a kind gesture from a lovely woman who attends regularly. She stopped to let me know that every single volunteer here greeted them genuinely – and they were just *so nice* each time her family came through the line. I graciously accepted her feedback and felt proud of what we'd accomplished; a well-run food pantry with both happy guests and volunteers who truly wanted to be a part of it.

Our guests come to us from all walks of life and from different circumstances, and if they need assistance – we are happy that they have found us. Their experience should be discreet, positive, and supportive. I am so proud of my Saturday crew – each person has a job they are good at, that they look forward to doing each weekend. Not to mention I'm proud of my numerous behind-the-scenes volunteers who also make this a reality: teams on both Thursday and Friday take great care in our food bank deliveries and shelf stocking, as well as food transport and setup in the Fellowship Hall – it truly takes a village. Even with all the unrest in the world, it's comforting to know that – simply put–people still want to help each other.

I'm very happy that when we were ready to start serving indoors again, after surviving the worst of the pandemic curbside, FCCOL trusted us to come back in with a solid plan to safely utilize the church – my goal is to always have a calm, chaos-and-drama-free setting – warm, bright and clean– in the lovely Fellowship Hall. Having all our staff, volunteers and guests on the same floor makes a difference. Many thanks to our ministers, office staff, our Sexton, Sean, assistant Bill, and our cleaning service, who all support our mission. Happy Holidays!

Because this is so close to Christmas this year, knowing that this is a busy time for so many folks, we're reaching out to ask if there are any volunteers who would be willing to **make a main dish casserole ahead of time and freeze it for us to use that night.**

Our in-house committee chairs, Julie Kuja, Charlie Hosley and Cathy Gentry are doing incredible work as they engineer the system that enables our church to serve once a month at DINE. Each month a major board within the church assumes the responsibility for the food. But December is always a challenge and they would welcome **any** and **all** help as they plan for this Christmas-time meal.

The numbers of folks seeking food is increasing, and on our Sundays we prepare food for the Homeless Hospitality Center and another outreach program within the city. We have been serving roughly 120 meals each month; but as winter approaches we anticipate that number to increase by at least 50. It is an enormous task and we are very grateful to all those who help!

Diaper Bank Saturday: Information for New and Not so New Members

The Diaper Bank is now in its 5th year of operation. Once a month, on Saturdays, in conjunction with the Food Pantry, diapers, baby food, and wipes are distributed to families with infants and toddlers in need. There have also been the unexpected gifts of knitted hats, nearly new baby clothes, and books. Since its inception, 2,193 packages of diapers have been donated and disseminated.

During its first year, also, the Diaper Bank was faced with the catastrophic COVID pandemic. Every pantry guest with children in need, received diapers regardless of where they lived. During the height of the pandemic, diaper distribution reached 90 babies in one month.

Guests outside our service area are now receiving diapers at sites established in their communities as a result of the pandemic. Currently, monthly diaper distribution in Old Lyme stands at 40 – 50 babies.

The Diaper Bank is staffed by volunteers, the same volunteers that signed on 5 years ago. We continue to meet a need that improves the health of every child who comes through our doors. Those 2,193 packages mentioned earlier, came from generous monetary gifts and donations of diapers from members, Church boards, friends, and anonymous individuals who heard about our work.

The mission of the Diaper Bank remains constant: offer hospitality and support the dignity of our guests who we greet on Saturdays. Gifts of diapers can be left on or near the Food Pantry box located at the top of the stairs leading to the basement level.

(all kinds of socks and the coffee should be ground please). Please bring your gifts and place them beneath the tree anytime between now and Christmas Day. An/ Update on the David W. Good Memorial Fund

Shortly after David Good's memorial service this past April, FCCOL invited members and friends to contribute to a fund established in his honor. Thanks to the generosity expressed by many of you, that fund now stands at a little over \$22,000, and counting. To reflect David's long commitment to mission partnerships and education, the ministers, in consultation with the Board of Trustees and the Endowment Committee, have decided that the fund will be used to support the ongoing work of our partnerships. The fund will be invested along with our endowment, though unlike the endowment itself, it will be available for use when needed. Whether for Green Grass or Palestine, for South Africa or Haiti, or a newer venture, the David W. Good Memorial Fund will be used to expand upon the work that David began, and that we continue in his memory.

Judges Farm Excursion

On November 20th, the Environmental Committee sponsored a field trip to Judges Farm in Old Lyme. Led by Mariette Brown, an enthusiastic group from FCCOL was treated to a tour of the beautiful facility by co-owner Matthew Griswold. Nestled into Griswold Point, the 10-acre farm specializes in growing potted perennials, annuals, herbs and vegetables for wholesale distribution to garden centers and nurseries across the northeast. Sadly, for you holiday shoppers, the farm no longer grows Christmas trees for sale. During peak season, the farm provides jobs for over 50 employees.

The owners of Judges farm (Matthew and his brother Martin) are dedicated to targeting long-term sustainability, and to that end, have incorporated several environmentally friendly innovations into their operation. The planning has increasingly focused on expanding the farm's line of native plants and seeds (of which they currently grow over 90 varieties). As noted in the farm's website, "*Natives are tough, disease resistant, deer & rabbit resistant, drought & flood tolerant, even salt tolerant in some cases. Finally, native pollinators know & love native plants, and the two go hand in hand.*"

The farm has also made great strides in reducing fossil fuel consumption and in achieving "home grown" energy independence. Staggered between the native seed beds are arrays of some 388 photovoltaic panels that generate over 120KW of solar power. These panels produce over 300% of the farm's electric needs and have been oversized to accommodate the farm's next new investments – electric farm equipment and Battery Electric Vehicle (BEV) trucks. With four trucks on order, the owners hope that the 500-mile range of these new electric vehicles will facilitate all the farm's northeastern area delivery needs.

Our thanks to Matt and Mariette for a fun and informative afternoon and a special thanks to Judges Farm for donating the plants sold each year at the FCCOL White Elephant Sale!

GIVING MATTERS

What does Stewardship Mean?

For many the concept of stewardship is about money. Members and friends have it and the Church needs some of it. However, an exclusive focus on money confuses ends with means. A more spiritual understanding of stewardship requires a more enlightened view.

Making God's love and justice available where and when needed requires resources. FCCOL freely offers services and widely promotes justice without compensation. But pastoral counseling, community outreach, and mission partnerships are not free. So, stewardship contributions – congregational generosity – make the good that FCCOL does possible. Stewardship contributions are a means to a compassionate end.

The love that compassion offers is unconditional. It is not judgmental. It is offered freely without any expected return. So, it is not transactional or strategic. It may not be deserved. It may be offered to people you don't know, or to people with very different political views, or even people you don't particularly like. Compassion is a radical form of love. It invites a deep empathy into the suffering of others. It empowers action to help relieve that suffering.

A biblical example is found in the parable of the Good Samaritan. The Samaritan makes no judgement. He effectively provides a blank check to help heal the poor soul that was badly beaten on the dangerous desert road between Jerusalem and Jericho. Closer to home many members and FCCOL friends help feed SSK&P guests, help shelter the homeless, educate Haitian children, resettle refugees, provide diapers to parents who need them. Is every recipient deserving? Do we like their politics? Compassionate action is judgement free.

So, a spiritual way to think about stewardship at FCCOL is that it is about unconditional compassion. Money helps provide the means. But compassion – radical empathy with the suffering of others – is the end. Stewardship is about a type of love. Love we offer unconditionally. As a community of faith, we are ultimately concerned with the welfare of others. Our Stewardship contributions enable FCCOL to activate our values. As we take action, we are remaining true to our founding 'Pilgrim Tradition' as seekers. We are seeking to build, nurture, and maintain more meaningful connections with each other and with the wider world. Why? Because being connected enables us to rely on one another so no one is alone.
