Board of Missions Sharing Grace by the Pound

Near the end of April, the Rev. Steven Jungkeit delivered a sermon entitled, "The Sacramentality of Everyday Life," that celebrated "moments of grace within a frenetic and merciless world." To make the case, Steve drew upon the lessons and themes contained in a popular television show called *The Bear* that revolves around a high-end chef and his staff in a low-end, Chicago sandwich shop.

Steve explained that one of the staff, a minor figure, learns the importance of attending to detail when serving others and in doing so, finds grace. "Grace is when someone intuits our needs and then meets then, just because," Steve said. "Through the acts of attention and care we lavish on one another, we have the power to confer such grace."

For more than 30 years that kind of grace has been delivered in the food pantry that our church operates as a host site of the Shoreline Soup Kitchens & Food Pantry (SSKP) network serving 11 Towns in Middlesex and New London Counties. SSKP has five food pantries where registered guests can obtain groceries and eight daily meal sites where people can find a free hot meal. In 2023 SSKP shared almost 2 million

pounds of food with 162,00 registered guests – or enough for almost 1.5 million meals

SSKP was founded in Essex in 1989 in recognition that food security had become an issue for many that was not being met by municipalities. Today, more than 11,500 households are registered in the 11 Towns SSKP serves. The number of registrants in Old Lyme is 239 and in Lyme, 21. Food security was an issue then and its importance as a societal problem has only grown. The organization has operating budget of around \$2 million that is largely supported by donations of foods and funds from corporations, individuals, area chain stores (Big Y and Stop & Shop) local foundations, faith communities. community gardens and food co-ops. It receives no government support.

Between 8:30 and 10:30 most every Saturday morning will find dozens of individuals and families who have registered with SSKP FCCOL pushing their shopping carts through Fellowship Hall, filling their baskets with a complete array of grocery products that include fresh produce, canned goods, staples, dairy and eggs, frozen meats, bread and baked goods, as well as snacks and pet foods. In 2023 SSKP FCCOL shared 178,292 pounds of food with 1,058 guests – enough for 112,157 meals.

In addition, on the first Saturday

of the month, a group of FCCOL volunteers distribute diapers and baby food. Another ancillary program conducted by FCCOL is the "backpack program." In 2023 the program provided 3,836 pounds of snacks and other foods for 1,189 students in nine local schools.

The church supports SSKP in numerous ways. It collects food and diaper donations from members and provides financial support as part of the local outreach programs overseen by the Board of Missions. In addition, the church provides some 2,000 square feet of storage space directly below the meeting house where visitors can see rolling shelves of canned foods and groceries, as well refrigerators freezers. and shopping carts, moving carts and coolers.

And, of course, one of the most important contributions from FCCOL are the members who volunteer. According to Audrey Brainerd, who has managed the pantry since October 2019, some 39 volunteers participate every week. A crew unloads food truck deliveries on Thursday and another crew unpacks the food and produce and stages it for distribution in Fellowship Hall on Friday.

All This Sainted Difference: Buscando Haiti

(Journey to Eastern Cuba, March 13-23, 2025)

One of the many projects we've undertaken at FCCOL over the past several years has been to explore how the history of Old Lyme, and of Southern New England more broadly, has been shaped by contact with peoples of the African diaspora. We've learned of more than 300 enslaved people that lived on the spaces we now use for worship, for school, and for other activities. We've commemorated many of those individuals through the Witness Stones. With that, we've also opened an exploration of African diasporic rituals and music, here at home (with visits from Román Díaz and his ensemble) and by traveling to Ghana, Togo, and Benin, as well as other key locations in this story, like New Orleans and Haiti.

Now plans are afoot to visit the Eastern section of Cuba, centered around Santiago, from March 13-23, 2025. It's a section of the island called *Oriente*, a place that few outsiders now visit. It was there that thousands of Haitian planters and their captive workers fled after the Haitian Revolution. In exile twice over, the enslaved population there preserved the rituals, music, language and culture that had sustained them across both the Middle Passage and the Windward



Passage (the straits separating Haiti and Cuba). To this day, those traditions can be found throughout Eastern Cuba, a living monument to the tenacity, courage, and creativity of a people across time and space.


In cities and mountain villages, we'll be exploring those traditions. This will be a journey with a heavy emphasis upon music and dance, which is how religion is conveyed in this part of the world. We'll be attending ceremonies every single day, and sometimes twice a day. We'll learn the history of the traditions we're encountering, and we'll also do a deep dive into the history and culture of the entire region. We'll be staying in the houses of locals. Because of conditions in Cuba, and because of the secretive nature of these traditions, this is a world that very few people get to access. But FCCOL will have that opportunity.


The journey will be organized and produced with our friend Ned Sublette, who has written the book on Cuban music, called, fittingly, *Cuba and its Music: From the First Drums to the Mambo*. Ned has joined us several times in Old Lyme, and he's been exploring the music and rituals of Cuba for the past 35 years. He's calling this journey *Oriente: Buscando Haiti*, which loosely translates as "looking for Haiti in Oriente." It's a resonant title, since our community hasn't been able to visit Haiti over the past several years. But we'll find Haiti, as it happens, in Cuba.


Email Steve Jungkeit if you're interested in learning more about this journey (steven@jungkeit.net). It's a standalone experience, but it builds upon what we've done in West Africa in early 2024, as well as our visits to New Orleans and Haiti. And so why not come and discover a world of spirit, music, and culture that has shaped the history of the modern world?

Addendum: in preparation for this journey, I'll be exploring several key books this summer: *Tell My Horse*, by Zora Neal Hurston (the legendary folklorist and novelist who collected and preserved the stories of African Diasporic peoples

throughout the Americas); *Divine Horsemen*, by Maya Deren (an experimental, avant-garde filmmaker in the mid 20th century, who was shaped by the traditions of Haiti); and *Island Possessed*, by Katherine Dunham (a dancer and choreographer who learned a crucial part of her art in Haiti, before sharing it more widely in the United States and beyond). In addition, I heartily recommend Ned's book, along with Ada Ferrer's Pulitzer Prize winning *Cuba: An American History*, for an overview of what we'll be exploring.

On Saturday, more than 20 volunteers participate in the actual distribution to guests. FCCOL volunteers are involved in all three days, and many are longtime participants, including Henry May, Liz Edmonstone and Britt Sinay, along with others quoted below.

John and Angie Falstrom have been Friday morning volunteers since February 2018. "Working side by side with Audrey and the wonderful people that share in the belief that we should be giving back when we can has given me some of my closest friendships that are nothing short of amazing," says John. "I'm so happy that I have the opportunity to help others, even in this small way," says Angie.

Gary Shettle started working at pantry in 2015, and more recently his wife, Mary Jo, has served in a back-up role for absent volunteers.

He started with the Friday crew, unpacking produce and moved to Saturdays when he distributes fresh fruit and citrus. "I would not trade this experience for many things in my life," he says. "It makes you appreciate what you have but at the same time admire those who are working hard each and every day trying to provide for their loved ones."

"When you see those smiles on our friends and families, it just makes you smile and appreciate that in some small way you are able to help," Gary continued. And Joy Bylan agrees: "I dare say it makes all of the volunteers go away with a smile feeling as though they have accomplished something."

Joy started working at SSKP FCCOL almost 15 years ago. "It was the first thing I did after I joined the Church. I loved it from the beginning ...," says Joy.

She has worked in various capacities

over the years and now distributes shopping carts to guests." It is wonderful to greet each guest and talk briefly with them," she explains. We try to make the pantry a welcoming place each and every week."

As Steve observed in his April 28 sermon, "We are all called to be ministers in the tradition we belong to the priesthood of all believers, it's called."

To see this ministry in action, FCCOL members are encouraged to visit Fellowship Hall Saturday mornings, and if there is sufficient interest, a tour of the pantry space below the Meeting House could be arranged. And, of course, donations of odd and funds are always welcomed.

Several members visited the gardens of Fresh New London this month. FNL works with families and youth of New London to bring fresh produce to families in need while building community.

Not only do they grow food, they are working in partnership with the Ledge Light Health District and the Southeastern Connecticut Community Land Trust (sectclt.org) to provide a weekly food pantry at "The Place for Community Wellbeing."

The pantry is located in the former New London American Legion Hall. It serves 500-600 families per week. Health care workers from L&M visit the pantry to provide health screening, vaccinations, and teaching. Plans for the building include creating a commercial kitchen for the community to use, offices for social services and mental health workers.

One Great Hour Of Sharing

Thank you to EVERYONE who contributed to our Easter offering for the One Great Hour of Sharing. These funds are made available through the United Church of Christ for emergencies worldwide wherever and whenever there is a need. This year we were able to contribute \$9,320 to this important cause. We have frequently been cited as one of the most generous UCC churches in the country.

Your Mission Dollars at Work:

5 members of the Board of Missions toured the **Homeless Hospitality Center** (HHC) in New London. Many of us in the congregation are familiar with their existence, founding and mission, but the things that struck us at our visit is both how very effective HHC is at housing people, and how great the need is. Affordable housing is in crisis - and HHC is on the frontlines of aiding people who need a safe, affordable place to live. In the last year they have seen their elderly population skyrocket, and the length of time to find an affordable place to live go from a month to over six months. As the needs change and arise, HHC has responded with a special respite care facility for elderly and ill, as well as a safe quiet space for veterans with PTSD.

Once housed, HHC has found that people will get creative about staying in their homes. While many become accustomed to their homeless situation, HHC has developed strategies over the years to minimize the time spent in the shelter.

There are two goals: get people into homes, and keep them there. Homelessness is so much more than not having a roof over your head. HHC attempts to address some of the things we all take for granted with a vast array of programs and services: help so people can avoid homelessness in the first place; counselors to help the newly housed stay in their homes; an *address* where shelter residents can receive mail; a phone; free wifi; laundry facilities; coaching and computer access for job applications; a ride; a simple doctor visit (Community Health Center has a clinic right at the shelter,) financial support to repair a car so someone can get to their job; extra help with security deposits to make the last hurdle into an apartment. The list is endless, as are the opportunities for volunteers. The work HHC does is truly one of the success stories of Southeastern Connecticut's social service responsibilities. They work hard to get people off the streets, and give aid to those who are on the streets. They welcome volunteers with all sorts of skills. For more information, see https://www.nlhhc.org/

GIVING MATTERS

A sincere **THANK YOU** goes out to our members and friends who have committed to support the church's 2024 Stewardship financial campaign. As we have said many times, over 75% of the church's annual financial needs come from individual contributions from our members and friends, and so it is no cliché to say the church couldn't do it without you all. We have received commitments of \$578,699 from 277 pledgers. This is encouraging since the total exceeds the 2023 campaign. However,

this total came from somewhat fewer givers than last year, which is of some concern. This also means that the <u>average</u> commitment continues to increase each year, so, we doubly appreciate the increased generosity of those who responded. Of the 277 commitments, 89 increased their amount over 2023, and 24 were responders for the first time.

However, a challenge still remains for 2024. Due to the relentless march of inflation, our budget for the year still

shows a deficit of expenses over expected income, even after a planned additional infusion of \$50,000 from the church endowment fund and a 25% reduction in benevolence giving.

THANK YOU again to all those who have pledged. And we hope, that for those who are able, we can count on additional support for 2024.
