

Acts 2: 1-13

All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every people under heaven living in Jerusalem. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

FCCOL DONATIONS LIST FOR CUBA

From March 11-21, travelers from FCCOL will be visiting Cuba, going to communities around Santiago de Cuba. Cuba is facing acute shortages in all sorts of areas, but the most urgent are related to medical care. Hospitals there are faced with a severe lack of surgical instruments and basic supplies, as well as pharmaceuticals that are necessary for patient care. Our travelers have been requested, if possible, to bring some of these supplies with them. But we're putting this list out for our whole community, in hopes that together, we can all provide some basic relief for Cuba. Here's the list of needs: (the links are embedded in the copy)
