Dear Friends,

"Behind the monastery, down the road, there is a cemetery of worn-out things where lie smashed china, rusty metal, cracked pipes and twisted bits of wire, empty cigarette packs, sawdust, corrugated iron, old plastic, tires beyond repair: all waiting for the Resurrection, like ourselves." -Ernesto Cardinal, The Gospel of Solentiname

Walking up the sidewalk towards our church a few Sunday mornings ago, we had to dodge the tents set up on our front lawn. Our young people participated in the annual Sharing Humanity night and slept outside under chilly skies in order to experience the hardships of being unhoused. This FCCOL Youth Group tradition is one that dates back nearly 20 years. It has had many names; Box Night, No Room at the Inn and now we call it Sharing Humanity Night.

While it's true we want our young people to have some real-life exposure to the needs, challenges and reasons for homelessness, we also want them to understand what Jesus meant when he said to the disciples, "when you gave a meal to someone who was hungry, when you gave them a coat, when you visited them in prison, you did this for me" (Matthew 25: 35-40).

Ultimately though, we want all of our kids to know first hand what matters most about this faith business we call "church". And that sharing our humanity and loving "the other" across the divides of stigma, separation and arbitrary boundaries is essential to becoming more human ourselves. We talk together about the power of listening to another's story and knowing a person's name and how that dignifies each person and lifts up the divine signature within each person. We all become more human ourselves; and that experience changes you for the rest of your life. Therein lies the hope for our world.

God's Neighborhood

We all live in communities. In Sunday school this month, we continue to learn and celebrate the communities we're all a part of...with our families, friends in school, friends in church, and our neighbors here and around the world. Living in a community is what we are designed to do! Do we live in a community intentionally, with great care and love for our neighbor? Or do we live in a community carelessly and risk hurting others unintentionally? Living in a community intentionally is a faith practice because it lets us turn our everyday interactions with others into something holy and full of God's love.

Sunday, April 6: As Spring blooms all around us we'll notice all the ways God's beauty shines in its uniqueness and diversity. We'll read Psalm 139:14 which reminds us "I thank you, God—you're breathtaking! Body and soul, I am marvelously made!" In JPF, our middle schoolers will host guest librarian, Nike Desis, as she helps us to explore the vocabulary of respect we use every day to address one another in conversation. She and her high school assistants will help us to plan an adult forum for our community about this topic.



Sunday, April 13: It's Palm Sunday! We'll participate in a parade of palms during the church service and then, read the story of Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem on a donkey from the gospel of Luke 19:28-40 (which begins what we call "Holy Week"). Our Youth Group will be hosting guest and church member, Carolyn Wakeman, who will share her work with the Witness Stones and her research into the enslaved people of Old Lyme dating to the 1600's-1800's. We'll learn the names and stories of those people who were enslaved in our community and for whom we've honored by placing Witness Stones plaques on the front lawn of our church. Students will help to clean the Witness Stones together as a service project. Our Youth Group students are asked to provide a snack or drink to share during their meeting.

Tuesday, April 15: Happy Vacation! Our Youth Group will take the train into NYC to tour the Statue of Liberty and then the Ellis Island Museum to learn about the great migration to the U.S in the 1800's. Meeting at 8 am at the church to go from there.

Sunday, April 20: Happy Easter Sunday! We have two church services today at 9:00 and 11:00 (and a sunrise service at 6:00 am at Griswold Point). There's no Sunday School today!



Sunday, April 27th: We'll celebrate Earth Week with a Flower Sale this Sunday! God's Neighborhood will plant flowers and help in some way in the sale of spring flowers to raise money for the Heifer International Nonprofit Organization.








Reading the South African Kairos Document

DANTE'S PARADISO

On Maundy Thursday, April 17th, we will return to Dante for the third and final part of The Divine Comedy - the Paradiso. It's an often overlooked and under read section of the poem, as many readers have preferred the creative torments of the Inferno and the Purgatorio. But it's actually a beautiful and moving finale to the entire poetic journey - and it's loaded with theological and psychological, as well as social and political insights. Where the Inferno demonstrates the violent disorder that besets human lives and societies governed solely by self-interest, and the Purgatorio demonstrates what it is to heal from those disorders, the Paradiso is bold enough to imagine what flourishing human lives and communities might look like, refracted through the lens of a Divine love.

As in previous years, we'll be reading the entirety of the poem aloud on Maundy Thursday, following our traditional service. We'll begin at 7, and continue well into the night. Individual readers are encouraged to sign up for particular cantos. There are 33, and so we'll need 33 readers - there are still a few available! Those who have already signed up can pick up their assigned cantos in the church office. And, like the previous two years, commemorative posters will be made for the evening.

For those who might be interested, a few enthusiasts have been meeting on Mondays at 6:30 in the Hoag Parlor to read selected cantos. The conversations are lively, and we've been uniformly inspired by the insights that emerge from lingering with Dante's images. All are welcome to join us as we prepare for Maundy Thursday.

There are any number of worthy translations, but we've been favoring the Hollander and the Palma translations. If you're interested in some of the secondary literature, Peter Hawkins' Dante's Testaments is highly recommended, as is his lecture on the Paradiso found in Undiscovered Country. Another brand new resource is a history of the Commedia and its influence on the world, written by Joseph Luzzi: Dante's Divine Comedy: A Biography.

It's why here at FCCOL we travel to Cuba and South Dakota, Palestine and New York City, Haiti and West Africa and New London. Granted, Sharing Humanity night is only for one night and our kids all have blankets and beds waiting for them at home. However, hearing from someone who has lived the experience of being without shelter makes the reality of what so many face in our community more than real. Who knows, maybe one or two of our young people will solve the intractable problem of homelessness and lack of affordable housing once and for all someday soon!

Thanks to church member Dana Dixon, a counselor at the Homeless Hospitality Center, we were able to meet and hear the story of Mr. Russell, a 70 year old who joined us for tacos in our Fellowship Hall. As he said, "I never thought I'd reach this age, and end up homeless!"

We are so proud of all of our young people and their commitment to this project. I also want to thank our Director of God's Neighborhood, Jolene Brant and Erin and Justin Cameron for chaperoning the overnight shift. You'll know them by their weary eyes and their halos!

According to the CT Coalition to End Homelessness, the numbers of those living without shelter has been on the rise in Connecticut for the past few years, which experts say is a result of rising rents and lack of affordable housing. The latest data showed that there were more than 5,000 people experiencing homelessness in our state in 2024.

Sadly, the number of people living in their cars or tents (if they have them) is rising- not just nationally but here along the shoreline. Last month, the Homeless Hospitality Center reported in their newsletter that 100 people had sought shelter, their highest number ever. If they're lucky, some people do get a bed or a corner of the floor; however, many end up under bridges or in the woods.

When I drove Mr. Russell home to the center, a staff member met us in the parking lot. When she heard we were from FCCOL she said, "you're the church that makes those amazing bags for our guests!" She went on to tell me how much people appreciate those handmade bags (created by the Ladies Who Stitch). She shared a story of when she recently gave a floral bag to a couple living outside. For the first time in a while they perked up and came inside to do laundry because they didn't want to get their new bag dirty. Said the staff member, "Those bags are so much more than bags. They are dignity."

In this month's issue, you'll find our Holy Week services and events taking us from Palm Sunday to Easter. For Maundy Thursday, April 17th, we are offering a special service of communion and music at 6:00 p.m. followed by the reading Dante's third and final part of the Divine Comedy, Paradiso. Steve tells me there are still a few openings left if you'd like to join us in reading a canto. Sign-ups in the main office.

As we journey through Holy Week together in this challenging time, you may want to sit with the Nicaraguan paintings of the Stations of the Cross on exhibition in our meetinghouse through Holy Saturday. They depict the Passion story as told through the artists of the Solentiname community in Nicaragua in the 1960's-1980's.

As we journey to the cross of Good Friday on our way to Easter, we remember all the communities of the world suffering under oppression today. We pray and practice resurrection where we see it, sharing our humanity each step of the way.



We serve promptly from 5:00-6:00. On occasion we have served as many as 170 meals to very hungry and appreciative clients. It remains a very important mission supported by our church.

Environmental Committee Homegrown National Parks – brainchild of Douglas Tallamy On the dwindling *"Good News"* front, this just in:


The progress map at Homegrown National Parks (HNP) <u>https://homegrownnationalpark.org/about-us/</u> places the state of Connecticut at **#6** in terms of native plant cover, (as I understand the map!)

I heard Entomologist Douglas Tallamy at the University of Delaware speak at the Hartford Garden show a couple of weeks ago, and am thrilled at this idea. HNP is grassroots call-to-action. Part of their mission is to help people understand the biodiversity crisis by breaking it down to a clear problem with a science-based solution, which is to add native plants and remove invasive ones everywhere that we live, work, learn, pray, and play.

"Our National Parks, no matter how grand in scale, are too small and separated from one another to preserve (native) species to the levels needed. Thus, the concept for Homegrown National Park, a bottom-up call-toaction to restore habitat where we live and work, and to a lesser extent where we farm and graze, extending national parks to our yards and communities." - Doug Tallamy

HNP is a free to join organization that helps folks restore the natural landscape. The concept is simple: replace half of your lawn (or more if you wish!) with native species. Lawns are nice and have their place and use, but do we *really* need such big ones? They are expensive! The lawns are deserts to native insect life, which underpins *so* much else.

I urge you to check out the website, and see what you might do to enliven your own yard. Get your own 'park' on the map!







GIVING MATTERS - GOOD MORNING and HELLO!

For those of you who do not know me, I am Candy Stanberry. I am now a PLEDGING MEMBER of the First Congregational Church of Old Lyme and a member of the Board of Stewardship.

I've been involved with the FCCOL for many years- as a pastoral counselor with my husband, Dr. Mark Stanberry, a speaker at Women's Retreats at Camp Claire, a co-leader of the original caretakers group, a contributor to a cancer support group co-lead by my husband and Carleen, and as a speaker with my husband at Adult Forums on mental health issues. *Although we donated our time and money, we were not members and we did not pledge*.

So what changed? My husband unexpectedly became very ill. We were supposed to have another 5 years that turned into 5 months. And what seemed like all of a sudden, my husband was in Hospice Care at MMH-a truly wonderful place. We had supportive family and friends with us, but we also had Carleen. Carleen sat with Mark, held my hand, and offered the most comforting prayers I've ever heard. She did not try to explain the unexplainable- why good people die young. She offered comfort, care, thoughtful words, and help.

When Mark died, I was scared, sad, angry, confused, and frightened. But, Carleen made sure **I never got lost**. We were able to plan a beautiful memorial service and reception here at the church. These were wonderful celebrations of my husband's life. The following year, Carleen married our son, Matthew, and his fiancé, Ann. This was actually their third marriage to each other but that's a long story that we don't have time for today. Having Carleen with us made this beautiful occasion a heartfelt celebration of love.

Being involved with the church grounded me and gradually helped me move forward. No one asked me to pledge or become a member. Our church offers so much: worship, children's services, youth group, music including choirs, Old Lyme Ringers, African music, New Orleans jazz, and hymn sings, adult forums, monthly lunches, potluck, Haitian and soup bowl dinners, mission trips, white elephant sales, Ladies Who Stitch, The Benevolent Society, bible studies, support groups, counseling and so much more. **These activities bring people together encouraging all of us to be more aware of and caring for each other.** As I began to participate in more of the activities, I gradually and much too slowly learned that becoming a member and, if you are able, pledging is important. Why? Because we need to know that these activities and services **are, or are not,** important to you. We need to know you care. And, we need to be able to make and keep budgets so we can plan the life of our church.

Last year, Carleen asked me to join the Board of Stewardship. She asked, I said yes, having no idea the responsibilities of this board. Raising money is definitely not my forte. But here I am sharing my story to remind all of you that **our church is a very special place with very special people**. *And yes, I am asking you to become a member and if you are able, to make a pledge*. We need to know you care and value all we do. Thank you for listening. God bless you all and the First Congregational Church of Old Lyme.


