Dear Friends,

Nearly two decades ago, I had the opportunity to visit Cuba for the first time with a small group of Presbyterian travelers. We stayed at a seminary in Matanzas, about 50 miles east of Havana. Everyone welcomed us warmly, and we learned about the differences between churches there and in the United States. We heard about how the US embargo, which at that point had been in place for nearly 45 years, had debilitated the lives of ordinary people on the island ("the embargo is a sin," one pastor told us). We were exposed to the Afro-Cuban religious expressions practiced in Matanzas and elsewhere, practices which, even then, spoke to me. And, from one of the seminary professors, I heard a phrase that I have never forgotten. "We know we have problems in Cuba. We just don't want your problems in the United States."

What I took from his words was something I have sensed when visiting our partnership communities around the world, from Palestine to Haiti and beyond. Though materially poor, the people in such places are rich in spirit and culture. By contrast, though materially rich, we in the US tend to be impoverished in matters of spirit and culture. Challenges and difficulties flow from both directions - having too much and having too little - but it was telling to me that of the two, this professor preferred the challenges Cuba was then facing to those we in the US were dealing with.

The intervening years have only heightened those problems - both for Cuba and for the US. Cuba faces grinding poverty and widespread food insecurity, which has prompted a massive exodus of their population over the

Sunday, March 30th: Food and fellowship are two things youth already know how to do well. Youth, however, may not be intentional about their practices around food or their socialization habits. We will work with them on centering themselves on the practical and physical aspects of food and fellowship, hoping that it will resonate with them as they become more aware of these daily aspects of their lives.

DANTE'S PARADISO

On Maundy Thursday, April 17th, we will return to Dante for the third and final part of *The Divine Comedy* - the *Paradiso*. It's an often overlooked and under read section of the poem, as many readers have preferred the creative torments of the *Inferno* and the *Purgatorio*. But it's actually a beautiful and moving finale to the entire poetic journey - and it's loaded with theological and psychological, as well as social and political insights. Where the *Inferno* demonstrates the violent disorder that besets human lives and societies governed solely by self-interest, and the *Purgatorio* demonstrates what it is to heal from those disorders, the *Paradiso* is bold enough to imagine what flourishing human lives and communities might look like, refracted through the lens of a Divine love.

As in previous years, we'll be reading the entirety of the poem aloud on Maundy Thursday, following our traditional service. We'll begin at 7, and continue well into the night. Individual readers are encouraged to sign up for particular cantos. There are 33, and so we'll need 33 readers. If we have more, some cantos may be shared. Like the previous two years, commemorative posters will be made for the occasion.

The last two years, Prof. Peter Hawkins has guided our efforts. This year we're going to try something different. For seven weeks leading up to Maundy Thursday (and perhaps one or two weeks afterwards - depending on how quickly we read) those who are interested are invited to read and discuss the *Paradiso* together. We'll try to do three or four cantos per session, touching down on some of the highlights within each section. It is a theological, poetic, and a moral education, all in one.

Those sessions will begin on Monday, February 24th, at 6:00, lasting for an hour or so each time. We'll meet in the church library, unless we find a better place. The schedule will look like this:


Feb. 24, March 3, March 10, March 17 (no meeting - Steve's in Cuba!), March 24, March 31, April 7, April 14.

There are any number of worthy translations. The Hollander translation is a favored one, but a brand new edition from Michael Palma has just been released, and it's reputed to be one of the best. But Mandelbaum, Singleton, Musa, Durling/Martinez or any number of others are also great. For supplemental materials, Peter Hawkins' *Dante's Testaments* is highly recommended, as is his lecture on the *Paradiso* found in *Undiscovered Country*. Another brand new resource is a history of the *Commedia* and its influence on the world, written by Joseph Luzzi: *Dante's Divine Comedy: A Biography*.

past two years. The most reliable estimates are that Cuba has lost nearly 18% of its population in those two years alone. Meanwhile, in the US, social inequality, an unraveling civic sphere and a libertarian ethos have produced a far right government breathing threats against even its closest allies.

Gestures of goodwill, friendship, support, and solidarity are therefore crucial in this newly hostile world order. While the United States government is in a full state of withdrawal from international commitments, most notably in regard to USAID and to NATO, it seems likely that it will now fall upon smaller organizations, like relief organizations and churches, to establish and maintain some sense of international alliance. Even as the US reneges on its wider commitments, places like FCCOL - together with a good many others - will be called upon to step into that gap. I would hope that the UCC, the Presbyterians, and a good many other denominations, might find ways to partner in order to meet those urgent needs.

In that spirit, from March 11-21, members and friends of FCCOL will be visiting the eastern portion of Cuba, Oriente, where we will explore communities shaped by Haitian culture. It's a way of retaining our strong commitment to Haiti, and to the gifts that Haiti has given to the world, from its emancipatory revolution to its religion, music, dance, food, and visual culture. We'll be exploring some of the African rituals, ceremonies and lifeways that continue to be practiced in that part of Cuba, building upon what we learned in Africa one year ago. And we'll be thinking about the ways these traditions are connected to southern New England, and to our community in Old Lyme.

But it's also necessary to respond to the material needs of Cuba. In particular, there is a need for medical supplies and over the counter pharmaceuticals, which are simply unavailable on the island, largely because of the embargo. Our travelers have been asked to pack those supplies with the rest of their luggage. And this is where you come in.


Below, you can find a list of medical supplies that we would like to carry with us. If you have the means and you're able, would you consider purchasing one or more of these items? It's a little like making donations to the Food Pantry, though with different purchases. You simply pick up a little extra at the store, and then drop it in the church office for our travelers. Some of the items have Amazon links that Anne can supply if you contact the church office.

This is a small but meaningful way that we in the US can demonstrate our goodwill. It's a gesture that feels ever more necessary in our fragile world, though it's one that we at FCCOL have practiced for a while now.

Say a prayer for us as we travel. Say a prayer for Cuba, and for Cubans. Say a prayer for Haitians, and for Palestinians. Say a prayer for everyone struggling to find a way forward in this violent and militarized world. Say a prayer for us all.

And stay human.





GIVING MATTERS

Pledging and Pews: As wealth and families grew, the church "sold" pews...

Pledging and pews have a close historical relationship. Why? Because for centuries, prior to the adoption of pledging practices in the 1860's, churches sold or rented pews to fund their operations including church construction and maintenance. In the sixteenth century, before the Protestant Reformation, worshipers stood, coped with stone seats or sat on plain wooden benches. Later, some wealthy families occupied elaborate, enclosed wooden boxes. Think of our privilege when sitting through the next service on our lovely red velvet cushioned pews!

But what is the connection between pledging and pews? As pews became common in English and American churches, it was often wealthy congregants who purchased and later rented pews. But what about those who could not afford to buy or rent pews? As told by Marilyn Nelson in her poem *The Meeting House Fire*,¹ 'The gallery seats, reserved for slaves, were free. But you couldn't see the pulpit from there.'² So, certain pew locations were more desirable than others. Pew practices fostered a hierarchical system. The wealthier congregants got the best seats in the house, and everyone knew who they were.

Beginning in the mid-nineteenth century, pew ownership or rental became controversial. It contradicted Jesus' welcoming message. The system didn't completely disappear in some churches until the mid-twentieth century. However, at FCCOL we moved from "the 'pew unit' system . . . [to] the giving of pledges for support of the church" when the church was rebuilt after the destructive 1907 fire. Pledging then became FCCOL's method for building the budget to maintain the Church and its missions. And it seems that the welcome addition of cushions "covered in crimson Venetian velour" came at the same time.

Certainly contemporary worshipers can celebrate the move away from purchased pews and assigned seats. Even though some seem to have strong seating preferences! So let's be grateful that all are welcome at FCCOL and that there is a place and a seat with a cushion for everyone. The congregation in 1907 could have chosen to raise funds to rebuild through the sale of pews. They chose not to, despite the fact that the previous structure had been significantly underinsured and that they had to find effective means to raise the substantial rebuilding funds. So, we can think of pledging as a source of worship comfort as well as a source of compassion for our near and far communities. Please pledge and contribute generously each year to FCCOL.
