Almost as soon as the final note of the Hallelujah Chorus is sung on Easter morning, ministers tend to turn their minds toward summer. It can be a long journey from Christmas to Lent, and then from Lent to Easter, and the promise of rest is alluring. That's helped by the warmth of the spring air, and the budding trees. In a way, that's ironic, for we have just proclaimed the new life entailed by resurrection, which ought to signify, as Clarence Jordan of Koinonia Farm once put it, "a Carried Away Church," filled with energy, brimming with life. As alluring as it may be to let up after Easter, and as necessary as a well-timed pause might be, there are ways in which we are called to move out into the world, especially after our Easter proclamations.

Plans are also underway for a return visit to the Green Grass community in South Dakota this summer. We plan to celebrate our 40th year of partnership with that community during our visit, and we also plan to explore sites important for the Lakota people, in order to better understand our shared history. We are especially hoping that families will consider joining us for this journey, scheduled from June 18-25.

Demonstration for Concern for Proliferation of Arms



On Wednesday April 16th our church welcomed about 25 walkers, who were making their way from New Haven to New London over the 6 days of Holy Week. Their journey – all on foot – was to call attention to the 80th anniversary of the dawn of the nuclear age. They were walking in demonstration of their concern over the proliferation of arms, as well as the on-going wars around our globe (in Gaza, Ukraine and Sudan as well as other regions). They spent some time resting and

pondering the stations of the cross from the Solentiname Community which were on display in the Meetinghouse, as well as enjoying some light refreshments. Their journey, which was organized by Frieda **4**Berrigan, was to culminate in Groton on Good Friday. It was an honor to have them with us.

A huge word of thanks to all who donated medical supplies for distribution in Cuba. In every community we visited, we were able to deliver one, and sometimes two bags overflowing with basic medical necessities - pain relief, vitamins, bandages, thermometers, and surgical head lamps (pictured above, and now in use!) - which you made possible. You were so generous, in fact, that we struggled to get everything down there, which was a wonderful problem to have. Everybody was deeply deeply appreciative. In several cases, we were able to hand

surgeons - including a pediatric surgeon - one of the surgical lamps, and it was as if they were receiving a gemstone, an object of exceedingly great worth. So again, thank you to all of you who donated those items, large and small. You helped to make a difference in the lives of ordinary Cubans!


Finally, I would be remiss if I didn't mention the enormous loss to the world that occurred the day after Easter. The death of Pope Benedict affects our Catholic brothers and sisters most fully, but we as Protestants can and should mourn the loss of such an eloquent and faithful witness to God, to the simple and unadorned ways of Jesus, and to the Church. Francis was a model of deep learning and worldly engagement, and he consistently used his platform to lift up the needs of the poor, along with others who suffer and struggle. He was a voice for climate justice, and he worried about the growing inequalities in wealth distribution around the world, demonstrating how both Jesus and the teachings of the Church modeled a very different way. During the ascendancy of the far right throughout the world, Francis spoke of the dignity accorded by God to all peoples, including and especially to immigrants. He was an inspirational world leader, and we can pray that the College of Cardinals will choose a worthy successor to Francis in this fraught moment of our collective history.



To which we can say, one more time, Hallelujah!








Immigration Ministry



Environmental Committee

I'd like to thank Claire Matthews for sharing this letter written in opposition to the proposed Brookfield compressor station:

"I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed gas pipeline in Connecticut referred to as Project Maple. This project represents not only a step backward in addressing climate change but also a threat to our environment, health, and local communities.

As Connecticut works toward reducing greenhouse gas emissions and transitions to renewable energy sources, the



construction of another gas pipeline and compressor station will exacerbate our reliance on fossil fuels. The expensive infrastructure will be paid for by us ratepayers and is counterproductive to the urgent need to invest in cleaner, sustainable energy solutions such as solar and wind.

Gas releases are built into the pipeline system and happen on schedule at all compressor stations. NIH has documented that these gas releases can cause cancer, respiratory diseases, cardiovascular and cerebrovascular mortality. Children, seniors, pregnant women, and people with pre-existing conditions are particularly vulnerable. The proposed addition to the Brookfield compressor is only 1,900 ft from the local middle school. The construction of this pipeline will also have a detrimental impact on local ecosystems, including wetlands, forests, and wildlife habitats.

Rather than investing in outdated and harmful fossil fuel infrastructure, we should focus on expanding clean energy solutions that will create green jobs, lower energy costs in the long run, and help Connecticut become a leader in environmental sustainability.

Governor Lamont said in a recent interview that while he supports the gas pipeline, 'CT will ultimately do what the people want.' We have an opportunity now to speak up on behalf not only of ourselves but especially our children and grandchildren."

Our 2025 Stewardship Campaign – now essentially completed – has resulted in \$617,569 in commitments and contributions from 270 very generous members and friends. This is the first time since 2018 that we have met and exceeded our annual goal of \$600,000.
