Dear Friends,

It's the time of year for resolutions and new beginnings, and I've got an idea in mind - see what you make of it: Let's read the entire Bible together this year. What do you say?

The Bible is probably the most frequently cited book in the world, and the least read. It is so ubiquitous that we think we know what's in it, even if that bears little resemblance to what's actually there. Sometimes, fear of what we might find there (what if the fundamentalists are right?) prevents us from actually reading the book. But this year, why not change that? Why not discover this complex compendium of stories, myths, poems, letters, visions, and wisdom for yourself? And why not do it in a progressive context, free of the dogma and coercion so often attached to reading the Bible?

I've created a day by day reading plan that will take us from Genesis to Revelation in 12 months. We'll cover three or four chapters a day, across 365 days. One day each week (Sunday) is free, and so you can either use it to catch up, or to take a day off. Then, on selected Sundays, we'll meet after church to talk about what we've covered - asking questions, sharing insights, voicing frustrations and encouraging one another along the way.

A reading calendar, with each day's readings sketched out day by day, is available on our website, and in the church narthex and office.



A Fresh Start: Embodied Contemplative Practices for the New Year!



The next question is, what Bible? There are many translations and paraphrases of the Bible, but here are three that are worthwhile: 1. The New Revised Standard Version - this is the most linguistically and theologically sound version out there. It was compiled by an ecumenical committee of many different backgrounds, and with a high level of scholarly care. The study version, with its notes and maps, is especially helpful. 2. The King James Version - it's not the most linguistically accurate version, and the language is, of course, dated. But look, it's Shakespeare's language, and this version is often stunning in its beauty and poetry. This is for those who come at the Bible from the vantage of literature - it's also the one I plan to use for this reading adventure. 3. The Message - this is a lovely and frequently powerful paraphrase by Eugene Peterson, a scholar of ancient languages. He renders the Bible in contemporary words and phrases, making it highly readable.

There are, of course, other possibilities, and some people like to compare different translations, which is a great idea. But...if you're planning to use a study Bible, I would highly recommend sticking to the NRSV Study Bible - the cover says The SBL (Society of Biblical Literature) Study Bible. Frankly, a lot of the other study Bibles remind me of poorly curated internet sites, with ads and messages and distractions flashing all around the text. For me anyway, those flashing messages tend to get in the way of actually reading the Bible, by (anxiously) telling you what you ought to be thinking and feeling as you read, rather than allowing you to simply encounter the text directly.

One further question: why do this now? I'll be preaching about this question early in the new year, but let me offer three quick responses here. First, in our culture the Bible has been hijacked by highly dogmatic voices that have over-simplified the book, while also turning it into a tool to control others. We progressives do well to claim the Bible for ourselves, and to read it with the nuance and care it deserves. Second, we're living in a time of declining literacy. For a people who value the Word, and words, we do well to go directly to the source, in order to acquaint ourselves more fully with the book that has shaped the imagination of believing and secular folk alike across the centuries. And third, this is a great opportunity for faith formation. Often, at FCCOL, we're focused on doing, which is one of the great gifts of our community. But I sometimes wonder if we miss opportunities for greater spiritual depth by bypassing the riches of Scripture and theology, together with the questions they raise for our lives.

I know, I know...more than a few of you will think that we've lost our progressive bearings by undertaking such an exercise. Set those fears aside. This is the book that has provided solace to countless people for more than two millennia. It's the book that fueled the German Resistance Movement in the Nazi era. It's the book that stood at the center of the Civil Rights Movement. It's the book that has fueled liberation movements in Latin America and Africa. And it can be the book (or one of them) that fuels our own response(s) to the struggles of the 21st century.


So what do you say? Shall we do this together?



P.S. It has been my habit in recent years to read a great classic or two each winter, one that I've neglected, or that I wish to return to. This year, I intend to reread George Eliot's *Middlemarch*. Some of us read it during Covid, but I find myself returning to passages from that novel often, and I want to experience it again. It's such a wise and knowing novel. If you're interested in reading it, let me know, and I'll organize a conversation for us. Admittedly, I fumbled a bit last year, and didn't manage to schedule a discussion of our winter reads. But I'll try to do better this year!

All This Sainted Difference: A Spiritual Pilgrimage to Brazil

August 10-20, 2026

In her poetry collection *The Cachoeira Tales*, Marilyn Nelson writes of a contemporary group of pilgrims, each with a story to tell, traveling together not to Canterbury, but to Cachoeira, Brazil. There, the pilgrims encounter the Sisters of Our Lady of the Good Death, who blend African, Indigenous, and Catholic ritual elements. Founded by those who had been enslaved during the 19th century, the sisterhood was established to serve the poor, while keeping alive the sacred traditions of Africa, handed down as a precious inheritance from one generation to the next. Every year in Cachoeira, the Sisters offer a three-day celebration of music and of dance, where the Orixas (African divinities who bear a striking resemblance to Christian saints) come in order to bless, heal, chasten, and encourage contemporary people. It is in Cachoeira that the pilgrims in Marilyn's poems converge. And it is in Cachoeira that pilgrims from FCCOL shall converge this coming August.



This is a once in a lifetime opportunity to explore the African ritual traditions of Brazil. Visiting not only Cachoeira, but locating ourselves in and around the city of Salvador, we'll encounter the rituals, music, dance, foodways, and visual art that have sheltered and protected human lives through generations of hardship. We'll visit *terreiros* (house temples) around the city and throughout the surrounding countryside. And we'll discover how these dynamic and aesthetically charged spiritual systems (Candomblé and Umbanda) have evolved across time. The centerpiece of our journey will be the Feast of Our Lady of the Good Death, where we shall witness how the Sisters become a living bridge between this world and the other.

Designed to resonate and to link with our travels to Haiti, Cuba, New Orleans, and West Africa, our pilgrimage to Cachoeira and Salvador will be organized with the help of our friend Ned Sublette, and his vast network of contacts in Brazil. It is a fabulous opportunity to explore a beautiful part of Latin America (it will be winter in Salvador, meaning we can expect temperatures in the 70's and 80's), together with the history and spirituality of the African descended peoples of Bahia.

This past year was a busy one for the members of the Board of Missions. Many of our long-standing benevolences and their clients experienced budget cuts from government sources, thus reducing their revenue streams. We carefully deliberated about each of our distributions, often communicating directly with agency organizers or conducting actual site visits to assess current program needs.

Because of the generosity of this congregation, altogether over \$64,000 was distributed to the following agencies this calendar year:

The Benevolent Society (TBS)

Happy New Year 2026! The board members of The Benevolent Society (formally known as The Ladies Benevolent Society) want to thank all of the wonderful people who helped out with and patronized our 2025 White Elephant Sale and our end of the year Elephants-in-Winter and Partnership Holiday sales. Because of you, both sales were the most successful ever, and TBS was able to increase the amount of our monetary mission commitments. Not only did we propose an increase of almost \$14,000 in our approved 2026 TBS Mission Commitment (\$84,2000) over our 2025 total, but we met at the end of November and voted to disperse \$35,000 in additional funds to help with the need locally and internally at FCCOL.
